1. Call to Order/Introductions

Chair Bruce Thomas began the meeting at 9:32 AM.

2. Review of past minutes/meeting notes

This item was tabled due to lack of a quorum.

3.1 Winter Bike-to-Work Day 2024

Ms. Tammy Zamoyski gave an overview of this year's worldwide event, to take place on February 9. She is tracking participation in real-time; there are currently participants in several areas of the state. Bedford REI is offering a free class on winter biking on February 2, from 6-7pm. On the day of the event there will be food, warming stations, and camaraderie available. There will also be four "Park and Pedal" locations in Manchester, enabling commuters to drive partway to work and cycle the rest of the way.

3.2 Overview of Proposed 2024 Regional Safety Performance Targets

Mr. David Tilton and Mr. Zach Swick provided an overview of some concerning safety trends from a national and international perspective; they went on to discuss Safety Performance Targets and recommended SNHPC adopt statewide targets for all but the Fatality Rate per 100 Million VMT. Instead of .919, the SNHPC recommended target is .795.

Mr. Mark Suennen thanked the presenters for showing results from the last several years. He asked if there are consequences for targets that are not met. Mr. Nate Miller replied that there are no consequences at the MPO level, but the state loses its ability to flex Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) funds if statewide targets go unmet. SNHPC must still track and report how the region has fared over time.

Mr. Miller added that traffic/red light camera use is ubiquitous in Southern Ontario, which affects driver behavior. Camera use will likely increase in the US; New York State has begun automated enforcement in work zones on Interstates 87 and 90.

It was the consensus of those members present to recommend adoption of performance targets to the MPO at its January 23, 2024 meeting.

3.3 Freight Vehicle Parking Inventory

Non-Motorized Fatalities and

Serious Injuries

Mr. Tilton reviewed preliminary results of the community stakeholder survey regarding truck parking in the SNHPC region. So far there have been 13 responses out of 75 invitations.

In response to a question from Ms. Linda Kunhardt, Mr. Tilton responded that survey data may spur additional study on potential new truck parking areas, which may include conversion of spaces at existing park and ride lots.

3.4 **SNHPC Website Updates**

Mr. Ben Herbert reviewed recent changes to the "Transportation Services" and "Transportation

Coordination" sections of the SNHPC website. These changes were made to help website visitors

find information more clearly.

In response to a question from Chair Thomas, Mr. Herbert said that requests for rides through the

website increased from 1 during the first fiscal year to 5 or 6 in the current fiscal year. Ms. Elizabeth

Robidoux added that it would be nice for municipalities to have this feature on their websites.

4. **Other Business**

Mr. Miller noted that since the final GACIT hearing took place on 10/25/23, Governor Sununu has

made several changes to the Draft Ten-Year Plan, including the following:

Six CMAQ projects (including five EV-related) were removed, including the Market Basket

charging stations in Manchester.

• These funds were redeployed to

Hampton Branch Rail Trail (~\$2.5 million)

o FTA 5339 Program (\$3.8 million) for transit capital projects including a new

maintenance facility for COAST

FTA 5310 Program (\$2.2 million for mobility management, \$1 million for statewide

transportation demand management to promote and support shared ride activities)

The Governor's version of the Plan becomes House Bill 2024; the next step is a public hearing in the

House Public Works and Highways Committee. A date for this hearing has not yet been announced.
