Minors: the big takeaways...

- The number of minors in the region is falling, slower than state
- 12 out of 14 municipalities saw their minor population decrease
- Minors per household have fallen by 35% since 1980

- 2010-2020
 - Largest absolute change: Windham (340)
 - Largest relative change: Auburn (16.7%)
 - Smallest absolute change: Manchester (-2,040)
 - Smallest relative change: Candia (-19.9%)





A SNHPC resident *under 25 years old* is more than *4 times* as likely to be a racial or ethnic minority as a resident *65 years or older*




- The number of racial & ethnic minorities is growing, still very low by national standards

- Population less than 18 years old ~twice as diverse than adult population



Housing: the big takeaways...


- The number of housing units is growing, rate declining
- Housing growth uneven across state; declines in west & north
- Recent housing growth slowest in at least 4 decades

- 2010-2020
 - Largest absolute change: Manchester (2,150)
 - Largest relative change: Auburn (18.0%)
 - Smallest absolute change: Francestown (-20)

 Smallest relative change: Francestown (-2.0%)

2020 Census: the big takeaways...

- SNHPC growing—older & more diverse
- Housing growth never recovered from late 20th century boom/housing bubble
- Regional patterns solidifying; thriving Merrimack Valley and Seacoast, struggling west & north
