SNHPC TAC Meeting July 20, 2023

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Purpose of the SNHPC Title VI Program

- The Title VI Program guides the SNHPC's efforts to ensure that its programs and services are provided without regard to race, color, and national origin, specifically:
 - 1. To ensure the level and quality of transportation service is provided without regard to race, color, or national origin;
 - 2. To promote the full and fair participation of all affected populations in transportation decision-making;
 - 3. To prevent the denial, reduction or delay in benefits related to programs and activities that benefit traditionally-underserved populations; and
 - 4. To ensure equal access to programs and activities by persons with limited English proficiency.



SNHPC Title VI Program Update

- The SNHPC's Title VI Program must be regularly updated (at least every three years).
- The SNHPC's Title VI Program is regularly reviewed by State and Federal agencies for compliance, including:
 - NHDOT Bureau of Rail and Transit (through their consultant RLS & Associates)
 - NHDOT Office of Federal Compliance
 - FHWA New Hampshire Division (via quadrennial MPO reviews)
 - FTA Region 1 (via quadrennial MPO reviews)



SNHPC Title VI Program Update

- The updated SNHPC Title VI Program was released for public comment on June 23, 2023, and the 30-day comment period runs through July 24, 2023.
 - Comments on the draft Title VI Program are welcome any time during the comment period and may be submitted to the SNHPC by regular mail or e-mailed to Nate Miller (<u>nmiller@snhpc.org</u>).
- The SNHPC MPO will hold a public hearing to consider adoption of the updated SNHPC Title VI Program at the July 25, 2023 meeting.




SNHPC Title VI Program Update Highlights

- Expanding the service area included in the Title VI Program to a total of 21 communities (the 14 communities in the SNHPC region plus an additional 7 communities in the Region 8 RCC area).
- 2. Incorporating non-substantive changes to the Title VI Notice to the Public, Title VI Complaint Procedure, and Title VI Complaint Form to reflect NHDOT's recommended template.
- 3. Incorporating public participation goals and strategies that reflect the SNHPC's recently-adopted Public Participation Plan.
- Updating the regional demographic data and Language Assistance Plan based on 2021 U.S. Census American Community Survey (ACS) 5-year estimates.




Updated Demographics - Minority Population



- Minority

Updated Demographics - Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Population



- LEP residents
 comprise approx.
 3.9% of the
 population of the
 SNHPC service
 area.
- This average is exceeded in 21 census tracts in the City of Manchester.



Updated Demographics - Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Population

- Limited English Proficiency is defined as, "Individuals who do not speak English as their primary language and who have a limited ability to read, speak, write, or understand English."
- Of the 3.9% of the population in the SNHPC service area identified as having Limited English Proficiency:
 - Approx. 5,046 persons, or 1.5% of the population, are Spanish speakers.
 - Approx. 1,628 persons, or 0.5% of the population, are French speakers.
 - Approx. 874 persons, or 0.3% of the population, are Russian, Polish, or Other Slavic Language speakers.
 - Approx. 855 persons, or 0.3% of the population, are Vietnamese speakers.



Language Assistance for the Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Population

- Federal LEP guidance identifies 1,000 individuals or 5% of the population eligible to be served falling within a specific LEP language group as a threshold ("Safe Harbor") above which vital documents should be provided in translation.
- Based on this threshold, the SNHPC will translate vital documents into both Spanish and French. Vital documents will include:
 - Title VI Notice to the Public.
 - Title VI Complaint Form.
 - Title VI Brochure.
 - Public Hearing and Public Comment Period notices for SNHPC metropolitan transportation planning products.



Language Assistance for the Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Population

- A binder with "I speak" language cards is stationed at the SNHPC office entrance to identify language needs.
 - SNHPC will coordinate telephonic interpretation services via Language Bank or Language Line upon determining the language needed.
- The SNHPC has incorporated Google Translate technology to help LEP persons efficiently navigate the website.
- The SNHPC will translate vital documents into other languages upon request.



Comments Received on the Title VI Program Update

- In addition to posting the Title VI Program for a 30-day public comment period, the SNHPC sent direct invitations to NHDOT, FHWA, and FTA to review and provide comments.
- No substantive comments have been received to date, although it is recommended that the SNHPC include a listing of TAC and MPO members as an appendix in the final document.
- The public comment period continues through July 24, 2023.
- Comments from TAC members are welcome at today's meeting.
